What is the licence?

Your university can apply for an annual licence for cases taught to undergraduate students.

What cases are included?

Enjoy access to over 30,000 cases from a diverse group of leading business schools. Cases are available on all aspects of national and international business and management.

How much does the licence cost?

The annual licence fee is between £2,000 (€2,500, \$2,700) and £8,000 (€10,000, \$10,800) depending on your whole university's annual income.

How are cases accessed?

Once your licence has been paid for, all staff at your university can access cases for use on undergraduate programmes via The Case Centre's website.
